This past 4th of July celebration was the 223rd birthday of our nation. With the Kolb-Kulp-Culp Reunion forthcoming on the 14th of August at the Perkiomen School in Pennsburg, PA it gives reason to reflect and consider. The history of our country is closely tied in with the heritage of our family. Those founding fathers and the original thirteen colonies developed an unprecedented relationship that has extended into what has become the most powerful and generous nation in the history of the world. 292 years ago our European ancestors took the opportunities offered them.

Why did they come to America?

When we consider the hardships of the journey and the primitive and dangerous conditions which awaited them, it is very natural to ask what motivated our early Kolb ancestors to undertake this quest. It seems likely that the motivations were some mixture of economic, religious, social and political factors. Most of the early eighteenth century Kolb immigrants set out from the Palatinate (Pfalz) region of Germany. This region had been devastated by the Thirty Years War (1618-1648). Mennonite framilies were unwelcome in Switzerland during the seventeenth century and many had fled by the end of the century to the Palatinate where their farming skills were appreciated, even though they did not have full religious freedom there. The Reformed Kolbs of Meckesheim were probably more motivated by social and economic reasons, but the Mennonite Kolbs of Wolfsheim probably were looking more toward Wm. Penn's assurances of religious freedom.

Three sons of Dielman Kolb and Agnes Schumacher of Wolfsheim were among the earliest Mennonites to make the journey. Jacob, Martin and Johannes came to Pennsylvania and Germantown in 1707. Jacob and Martin were active in the Mennonite churches at Germantown and Skippack and seemed to find their peace here, but Johannes moved on to South Carolina after about twenty years. Brothers Henry and Dielman followed in 1709 and 1717 and stayed to become leaders in the community. The Reformed Kolbs of Meckesheim came to northern Montgomery Co.

It is important that we consider their lives and what this country offered them. It is our responsibility to keep this torch of freedom alive. All this is fundamental so that future generations may continue to live in this precious environment.

We truly welcome your attendance at the Kolb-Kulp-Culp Reunion and the Goschenhoppen Folk Festival. Let's enjoy a great day together.





HAROLD KULP of Pottstown, PA and his family before have been dairy farmers in the same farm house location for 100 years. He has to supervise the milking of 150 Holstein and Ayrshire cows twice a day, 7 days a week, rain or shine. In 1998, the cows consumed over 15,000 bales of hay.
